Bee medicines

To prevent contamination of honey, which may be intended for human consumption, only products that have been authorised by the Veterinary Medicines Directorate (VMD) can be legally applied to honey bee colonies without a veterinary prescription. This fact sheet lists the authorised medicines that can be legally used by beekeepers on honey bee colonies in the UK without a veterinary prescription.

What are 'authorised medicines'?

In the UK, there are a number of treatments available 'over the counter'. However, not all of these will have gone through an assessment process to ensure that they are safe to the user, colony and environment, and to ensure that they are efficacious. To ensure you are using an authorised product, please consult the table below. Can I use products that are available in Europe and elsewhere?

When products are not authorised and/or available in the UK to treat or prevent a disease in bees, a veterinary surgeon can apply for a Special Import Certificate (SIC) to import a medicine that is authorised for such use in another country.

Can I use generic natural substances to treat my colonies?

Anything that is placed in a hive to control or eradicate a pest or disease is classed as a medicine and, unless prescribed by a veterinary surgeon, must be authorised according to the Veterinary Medicines Regulations (2013). Therefore, without a veterinary prescription, it is an offence to administer unauthorised products and/or home-made preparations (e.g., generic "raw" oxalic acid crystals, self-made thymol solutions).

What records should I keep?

Beekeepers are legally required to maintain a record of any medicines they purchase, use and dispose of. At the bottom of this fact sheet, there is a Veterinary Medicines Administration Record sheet, which meets all legal requirements of the Veterinary Medicines Regulations (2013). You may wish to incorporate it into your apiary records. Make sure you record all the listed mandatory requirements. Records should be kept for at least five years, irrespective of whether or not the colony concerned is no longer in that keeper's possession or has died during that period. This form is also available as a pdf.
